

# THE GOSPEL IN THE BOOK OF ACTS

In the book of Acts, we're going to see the gospel spread from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth, just as Jesus said it would, and despite a number of obstacles and trials that come along nothing can stop it. We're going to see the gospel spread to all different kinds of people, inviting them all into God's kingdom. We're going to see the power of the Holy Spirit, who enables people to see the glory of Jesus.

- We're going to see that the gospel is limitless It's for everyone!
- The spread of the gospel is limitless Nothing can stop it and nowhere is too far for it to go.
- The Holy Spirit is limitless Bringing power, healing and faith to everyone who believes the good news.
- The power of the gospel is limitless Bringing new life to the ends of the earth.

We're hoping this series will give us greater confidence to know that God is at work in us and at work in our city and region. There is no one beyond the reach of the gospel, so we can have confidence to bear witness to Jesus and his resurrection.

There is also a call to consider the resurrection for ourselves. The main characters in each chapter stake their lives on the truth of the resurrection. Rather than a comfortable existence, this book should shake us and provoke us to consider our own walk with Jesus. Are we prepared to stake our lives on it, to the point of expecting and rejoicing in suffering for the name of Jesus?

It is our hope that we'll press on to grow as disciples who sacrifice, serve and speak for the sake of others, to grow the renown of the gospel and to grow the church, all for the glory of Jesus. We can only do this, under God, in the power of His Spirit, so will you join us in praying that God's Spirit would be powerfully at work in us.

# WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT ACTS TO GET STARTED

Acts was written by Luke, who accompanied Paul on his missionary journeys, and it's second in a two part series that shows all Jesus began and continues to do in the world, through and for his people.

In Luke 1v1-4, we're told:


<sup>1</sup> Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, <sup>2</sup> just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eyewitnesses and servants of the word. <sup>3</sup> With this in mind, since I myself have *carefully investigated everything from the beginning*, I too decided to write *an orderly account* for you, most excellent Theophilus, <sup>4</sup> so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught.

Luke carefully investigated all that he wrote down so we may know the certainty of the things taught to us about Jesus and it's fair to say that the same method and goal is intended for Acts. In Acts 1v1-11, Luke writes:

- <sup>1</sup> In my former book, Theophilus, I wrote about *all that Jesus began to do and to teach* <sup>2</sup> until the day he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen. <sup>3</sup> After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God. <sup>4</sup> On one occasion, while he was eating with them, he gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. <sup>5</sup> For John baptised with water, but in a few days you will be baptised with the Holy Spirit."
- <sup>6</sup> Then they gathered around him and asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?"
- <sup>7</sup> He said to them: "It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. <sup>8</sup> But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." <sup>9</sup> After he said this, he was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight.
- <sup>10</sup> They were looking intently up into the sky as he was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them. <sup>11</sup> "Men of Galilee," they said, "why do you stand here looking into the sky? *This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven.*"

Where Luke's Gospel is about what Jesus began, Acts is about what Jesus continues through the work of His Spirit and through the witness of His Apostles. Acts tells the story of the gospel, that is, the story of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, spreading to the ends of the earth. The diagram below shows how the gospel grows and shows how the spread can be tracked through the chapters in Acts.

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# **GETTING STARTED**

# READ ACTS 15v1-2

- 1. What have we already seen in the story of Acts that helps us understand the concern in v1?
- 2. What possible motivations might lie behind this statement, positive or negative?

# **READ ACTS 15v3-12**

- 3. According to Peter, what did God require of the Gentiles for them to be saved?
- 4. How does Peter describe the law and circumcision? What does v10 mean?

For a Jew, the law of Moses and circumcision were central to their identity as the people of God. The problem was that they were unable to keep the law, and circumcision was only an outward sign that didn't necessarily translate into a life that brought glory to God. In this story, clearly some Jews have recognised that Jesus is the Messiah who fulfils the law and prophets, but they haven't moved on from their allegiance to Moses and the law.

5. What has changed so that non-Jewish people can now come to God without the need for outward signs and a commitment to the Old Testament laws?

6. What is James' verdict on the issue and on what basis does he come to this position?

7. What do you think 15v20-21 are trying to convey?

In his first letter to the Corinthian church, Paul picks up on these concerns.

# READ 1 CORINTHIANS 6v12-20, 8v1-13 & 10v14-11v1

8. Has Paul now imposed a "law" for the Gentiles that the apostles didn't in Acts 15? How do you understand it? How should Gentile Christians use their freedom?

SACRIFICE ATTITUDE BEFORE ACTION Have you fallen into the trap of thinking God wants an outward sign and obedience from you in order to be saved? — How is Acts 15 helpful if this is the case?

Have you laid a heavy burden on others who are coming to faith in Jesus? — How might the reminder that we're all saved by grace, through faith in Jesus, guide your repentance and your conversations?

SERVE HUMILITY BEFORE

HONOUR

Law and circumcision are not required now. We have freedom in the gospel. But have you taken that freedom for granted by not considering the impact of your actions on others? — What needs to change in your attitude and actions to help you serve those around you?

SPEAK TO GOD ABOUT PEOPLE Someone says to you "Christians have to keep the Old Testament law". How do you respond? How is Acts 15 helpful?

TO PEOPLE ABOUT

Who can you speak about Jesus with this week? Ask God for His Spirit to help you express your freedom in the gospel, but also for wisdom to consider the needs of others without burdening them with laws they cannot keep.

# Here are a few things we'll be praying about as we consider Acts 15:

- We'll praise God for his undeserved grace and kindness to us so we don't have to behave in a certain way in order to be saved, no matter how impure we are. We'll ask him to grant us faith that he will purify us and make us his people.
- We'll ask God to change our allegiance to the idols we follow, to be wholehearted in following Jesus instead. Because he has saved us, we'll ask God to change our thoughts, motives, actions and desires.
- We'll keep praying that God would give 8000 new people to Jesus in our generation in Rockhampton & Gracemere for
  a start, because Jesus is worthy of praise and because he offers his salvation to everyone. We'll pray for opportunities
  every day, every where we go, to speak to every one about Jesus.
- We'll pray for our mission partner, Cam, that he would continue to preach that anyone can be saved and transformed by Jesus, and that he'd have the joy of seeing God do that work.

- 4. Paul's encounter with the demon-possessed slave girl is strange because she seems to be telling the truth and yet Paul stops her proclamation. Why do you think he does it? How is the slave girl's life transformed by the gospel?
- 5. In previous chapters of Acts, the problems for Paul and his companions arise because of jealousy from the Jews. Now there is a different motivation. What are the girl's owners concerned about?

# **READ ACTS 16v25-40**

- 6. How is the jailer's life transformed? What makes the difference for him? What is the effect on him?
- 7. Imagine the jailer going back to work the next day. What difference do you think his new found faith in Jesus would make?

HUMILITY BEFORE HONOUR Lydia's life was transformed and she immediately opened her home to Paul. The jailer's life was transformed and he immediately opened his home too. It would seem that hospitality is one possible mark of a transformed life. Brainstorm with your group different ways that you, your families and the wider **rockypc** community might demonstrate the same openness and welcome to others.

From Acts 16, how would you explain the difference Jesus makes to someone who is investigating Jesus?
