

WHAT SHOULD WE DO WITH THE OLD TESTAMENT?


For lots of people the Bible is a strange book that is difficult to read and understand. That makes sense, after all, it's ONE BOOK made up of 66 books that were written by different people in different times and places, in different genres and original languages, covering thousands of years of human history, all many years before our own existence.

The Old Testament in particular can be difficult to read, understand and apply to modern life, so it often goes unread and undervalued. But ALL SCRIPTURE is God-breathed and useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work (2 Timothy 3v16-17). So, as we get DEEP IN THE WORD together and SEEK GOD, we want to make sure we don't miss what the Old Testament has to say to us. However, we want to make sure that we are equipped to understand it properly, so that we don't misunderstand or apply the Bible Story or our place in it.

Although, the Bible is 66 books, it's vital to realise that it tells ONE STORY and we are not the heroes, or main characters in that story. The Bible is a story ABOUT GOD and, in particular, what he has done for the world THROUGH JESUS CHRIST.

During this series, we are going to spend 10 weeks we're going to see how the OLD TESTAMENT fits together and points straight at Jesus. We'll be encouraged to see how a bunch of themes fit together and how we fit into this story as people living thousands of years later.

To help keep track of where things are up to in the BIBLE STORY a timeline has been provided. Each week, it will be helpful to remind yourself of what you've already seen so that you've got your bearings before plowing ahead.



It will also be helpful to bear in mind a few principles of an approach to the Bible called BIBLICAL THEOLOGY. These principles will help avoid the tendency to misapply OLD TESTAMENT stories that were written first and foremost about and to the OLD TESTAMENT people of God, the nation of Israel.

BIBLICAL THEOLOGY

- The Bible is a story about God, NOT us. We read it so we can know him, not as a guidebook for life or a moral rulebook or a self-discovery manual.
- Therefore, we're not the centre of its stories. It's about God and what he's doing ie HE'S the hero. eg David and Goliath we don't imagine ourselves as David we need a Messiah who saves us.
- The Bible is a story of the Creator, who was rejected but determined to bless and restore through Abraham's family, Israel — ultimately it's through Jesus that the whole of creation can be reconciled to God (Colossians 1v19-20)
- The story always leads to Jesus (eg all God's promises are 'yes' in him —2 Corinthians 1v20; he's the awaited Saviour Luke 2v27-32; he's the culmination of the law Romans 10v4, all Scripture is about him Luke 24v27) He shows us God's character and God's works best, he solves problems/tensions of the Old Testament, he fulfills prophecies, he's a better Saviour for the people, he does what no one else could do.
- We're Gentiles not Israelites. As we read the Old Testament, we're looking for what to learn about God and how it points us to Jesus. And we also see Israel's hearts and actions both good and evil and see how we're like them, as they represent humanity. But we're not part of the Old Testament covenant people (with circumcision and the law). Instead, we're joined to Jesus by faith, in the new covenant of the Spirit (Romans 4; 2 Corinthians 3v3). We're forgiven for our sinfulness, our desires are changed and we're enabled to please God. So what we learn from Israel's story is seen through the lens of the cross and the work of the Spirit in us.

HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THIS SERIES COMPANION

ON YOUR OWN—Take your time reading through each of the passages and consider where you are up to on the Bible Timeline. If you have time, work through the questions before your GROWTH GROUP so that you've started thinking about the topic before you arrive.

WITH YOUR GROWTH GROUP—Don't be afraid to stop and talk about things that grab your attention or raise questions for you. Above all, try to enjoy digging into the OLD TESTAMENT.

ON SUNDAY—Make sure you bring your SERIES COMPANION along with you, so that you can keep track of any questions you have and record the way that God's Spirit is helping you to understand His Word and grow in your love for Jesus.

These series companions are designed to be used as either a print version, or interactively on a device. Use whichever method is most helpful for you.






HOW GENESIS 2v18 IS WRONGLY UNDERSTOOD

It is very common to take 'alone' to mean 'lonely'. 'Ah,' we say, 'poor Adam was lonely. There he is in the garden surrounded by animals. But a pet dog, cat, ox, budgerigar or goldfish does not meet his relational needs. God will give him a wife so that he will not be lonely any more.'

It is very common to read it like this. One writer says that God is simply filling Adam's 'personal need'; another that 'the reason for marriage is to solve the problem of loneliness.' This is how twenty-first-century people understand it: that unless I am married I will not be loved, and unless I am married I am bound to be lonely.

The motto for this misunderstanding might be sex for the fulfilment of me or sex in the service of us. My concern is my fulfilment, sex to meet my needs. However it is a mistake to think that Genesis 2v18 ('It is not good for the man to be alone') means that marriage is created to meet my needs. There are two reasons why this is wrong, and a further two why it is disastrous in its results.

WHY MARRIAGE IS NOT THE ANSWER TO LONELINESS Reason 1: Genesis 2v18 must be read in its context



First, it is false because it takes the verse out of its context in the story of Genesis 2. Verse 18 does not come out of the blue, but is part of a drama that begins in verse 4. Right at the start of this second telling of the creation story, there is a problem: that there is no man to work the ground, to farm it (verse 5).

So naturally, God makes a man to do just that, to care for his world (verse 7). This is what human beings are for, as we learned in Genesis 1v26-28. So he puts the man in the garden and gives him his orders (verse 15), which are to work [the garden] and keep [or guard it]'. That is, Adam is to be the gardener or park-keeper, with the enormous responsibility and dignity of being entrusted with God's garden.

In this context God takes a good look at the garden and at little Adam standing bemused in the middle of it and says, 'I can see that it is not good, not because he is lonely (he may or may not be!), but quite simply because the job is too big for him to do on his own. This is why he is given 'a helper' rather than 'a companion'. If he was lonely, then a companion would be what he needed, to sit with him on the garden bench, to hold hands, and so on. But although no doubt Eve would have been a splendid companion (and a wife is called a 'companion' in Malachi 2v14), she is given him here as his 'helper', which simply means one who works alongside so that both together can do the task. It is worth asking why, when Adam needed a helper, God chose to make the woman, rather than another man. For, at risk of seeing either trivial or politically incorrect, we would have to admit that purely in terms of averages another male might have been stronger! So why the woman?

Genesis 1 and 2 suggest two reasons. Genesis 1 suggests that it is do with having children (1v28). This makes perfect sense. For if one gardener is not enough for such a great garden, nor will two be. They need to start a whole family of gardeners!

But Genesis 2 adds another reason, which is the delight of sexual intimacy. In verse 23, Adam responds to seeing Eve with a rapturous cry of delight: 'This at last ...!' At last here is the one who is the answer to his longing for a helper suitable for him, to work alongside him in delightful fellowship in the privilege of serving God in the garden.

Adam's cry of delight in Genesis 2v23 has been echoed by bridegrooms down the ages. There is here (as in verse 25) a natural 'Yes!' to sexual desire and delight untouched by shame. But even here, the context makes us remember that the final goal is not the delight of sexual intimacy. For this is delight with a shared purpose, intimacy with a common goal, and companionship in a task that stretches beyond the boundaries of the couple themselves. As we rejoice with the lovers in the garden, we must not forget that there is work to be done. The garden needs gardening. God's world needs watchful care and careful work. Those who are single will serve in many fruitful ways possible only for the unattached. But for those who are married, this work will be done together as a couple. So the motto for Carrie in Genesis 2 is the same as the motto in Genesis 1: sex in the service of God.*

*Sex is shorthand for the marriage relationship in all its fullness: in intimacy, friendship, partnership, fun and faithfulness. The motto is to remind us that the whole business of marriage in all its fullness is to be lived in the loving joyful service of God, as we look outwards from our marriages and as couples seek to care for God's world together. (p33)

Last week, we saw that God didn't abandon humanity in their sinfulness. He made promises to one man, Abraham, and his family, through whom he would bless the whole world. Abraham had traveled to the bountiful land of Canaan that God promised, but a few generations later, his family are enslaved and oppressed in another place, Egypt. We pick up their story with an Israelite named Moses.



READ EXODUS 3v1-10

As the Exodus story goes on, in line with his character, God does act to save Israel. After 10 plagues, the Passover and the parted Red Sea, Israel receive laws from God to mark them out as his holy, saved people. But they're immediately unfaithful, like a bride committing adultery on her honeymoon. Against this backdrop, God appears to Moses again.

God has named himself as the compassionate, loving, rescuing, forgiving and just God. He demonstrates it in the Exodus story, but he goes on to do it again and again in the Old Testament story. Let's read one example from the time after the Exodus, as Israel wander in the desert.





As the story of the Bible has progressed, we've seen God's determination to bless the world through one family, Israel. He demonstrated his loving, merciful and just character in rescuing them and showing them faithfulness despite their wayward hearts. Having left Egypt in the Exodus, Israel wandered through the desert for 40 years before finally arriving at the outskirts of the land God had promised them long before. The book of Deuteronomy records the pep talk that Moses gave them on the cusp of Israel entering the land of blessing. He recounts their story so far and the God-given laws that marked them out as God's special people.





Last week, we left Israel at the edge of the Promised Land with an appeal to choose life by obeying God's commands. They did enter the land and spent centuries in conflict with the peoples living there. You can read these stories in Joshua, Judges and Ruth. Judges tells of the darkness and disobedience of Israel's hearts and the ensuing chaos with this summary ending the book: 'In those days Israel had no king; everyone did as they saw fit' Judges 21v25. Samuel is the final judge and in 1 Samuel 8, the people demand that God give them 'a king to lead us, such as all the other nations have' (v5). God agrees to their demand. But Saul, the first king, disobeys God and is rejected. Instead, God says he has sought out 'a man after his own heart and appointed him ruler of his people'. (13v14)





Completely wrong

We saw last week that God chose David to rule over Israel by his Spirit, with faith in God and a desire for him to be honoured. Solomon, David's son, begins to reign with wisdom and is richly blessed by God (1 Kings 4). But the final assessment of his rule is that he lacked devotion to the LORD by following foreign gods (1 Kings 11). The kingdom is then ripped apart with Solomon's son ruling 2 tribes in the southern region, known as Judah, with the capital of Jerusalem. And the northern 10 tribes form a breakaway but are known as Israel, with the capital of Samaria (1 Kings 12). The story of God's people follows these two nations throughout the rest of the Old Testament. God sends prophets to them across the generations to deliver his verdict on their attitudes and actions. Micah is one of those prophets, who speaks to several southern kings of Judah.

READ MICAH 1v3-7

1. What rouses the LORD from his dwelling place?

2. What is the consequence for the northern kingdom of Israel/Samaria?

This is no surprise to us, they were warned that turning away from the LORD would mean exile from the Promised Land in Deuteronomy 30. The northern kingdom is captured and exiled by Assyria in 732 BC. They integrate with the local peoples and have a half-hearted religion from then on (see John 4).

Micah then shares God's assessment of the remaining southern kingdom and Jerusalem.

READ MICAH 3

- 3. Who does God say is at fault?
- 4. What are their hearts hating and loving?

Micah says that the biggest problem of Judah's people, prophets, priests and kings is failing to love what he loves. And they can't pretend it's all fine and they can't just offer a sacrifice to appease God. Destruction and exile are coming to the southern kingdom too (in 586 BC). But in a word of hope, the LORD explains what the people really need.

- 6. Can the people solve this problem with more sacrifices (or pretending there's no problem)?







GETTING STARTED

Last week, we heard the prophet Micah's warning to the southern kingdom of Judah that their injustice and lack of mercy would lead to exile. Isaiah was a contemporary of Micah. Chapter 6 records his commissioning as a prophet of the most holy LORD. He speaks about what the people see and hear.



READ ISAIAH 6v8-10

1. How does Isaiah's message reinforce the people's heart attitudes towards the God who cares for them? (cf Isaiah 5v1-7)

READ ISAIAH 6v9-13?

2. How does the Lord's answer to the cry of 'How long?' contain both judgement and hope?

Isaiah goes on to explain more about the seed that will sprout from the broken stump.

READ ISAIAH 11v1-5

3. What will characterise this fresh shoot?

READ ISAIAH 11v6-12

- 4. What will his reign achieve?
- 5. How does this echo the promises God made to Abraham (Genesis 12v1-3)?

Isaiah is sent to a hard-hearted people with a warning of exile, which comes to pass about 120 years later. All of God's promises seem broken — they are not in the land, their people are killed or enslaved and they're under God's curse rather than blessing. The people spend around 70 years in exile before they return to the land during the time of Ezra and Nehemiah. But this is a largely disappointing time as Israel doesn't have its former glory and the people's hearts are still far from God — the exile changed nothing for them. (see Ezra 3v11-13; 9v1-4)

How long Lord? When would the curse of the exile be over? When would they see the one who rules with God's Spirit, righteousness, peace and restoration? We fast-forward hundreds of years in the story to a lake in Galilee, when the words of Isaiah are on Jesus' lips.

READ MATTHEW 13v1-23

6. What are the four different responses to God's word, as Jesus explains to the disciples?

We are familiar with the parable and its explanation, but we often skip over the middle section. (v10-17)

7. How do Jesus' parables fulfill Isaiah's message?


The end of the exile means that Jesus is bringing the long awaited restoration, justice and peace that Isaiah foresaw. While some are still hardened by hearing the word, others will respond with faith, bearing abundant fruit of righteousness. And this is the moment that the doors are opened wide to gather in Gentiles like us too. We can hear and understand God's word too.

8. How can it be fair that those who have more are given more, while those without have their little taken away? (v11-12)

9. How can we know that Jesus is the longed-for king who ends the exile? (v16-17, 23) What is different in some people's hearts (compared with Isaiah's day)?



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- Praise God that Jesus has brought an end to Israel's exile he is the Spirit-filled king of justice, peace and restoration. Thank him that Jesus' arrival means we can be part of his kingdom too.
- Confess when we've been hard-hearted towards God's word . Pray that we would respond to his word with understanding, turning to be healed. And that we would produce abundant fruit of righteousness.
- Pray for friends and family who are calloused to Jesus, that his word would do its work in them. Pray that we would keep speaking, and that they might have ears to hear and softened hearts to turn to him.

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

GETTING STARTED

What do you like that everyone else seems to dislike?

Over the last two weeks, we heard words of warning from the prophets Micah and Isaiah. God said judgement was coming for his people and they would be exiled from their homeland because of their unfaithfulness. Numerous books in the Bible describe the trauma of this time (such as Lamentations, Daniel and Esther). Jeremiah and Ezekiel lived through this tumultuous period — Jeremiah largely remaining in Jerusalem and Ezekiel taken to Babylon. They give the same critiques of Israel's unfaithful hearts. But also offer hope of something new.



READ JEREMIAH 31v27-34

- 1. What will be 'no longer'?
- 2. What will be new?
- 3. Why is this what they need?

Ezekiel also describes a momentous time that is coming.

READ EZEKIEL36v18-28

- 4. What motivates the Sovereign LORD to take action for those in exile?
- 5. What will he do for them?
- 6. Why is this what they need?

Throughout the whole story of the Old Testament, we have seen Israel's (and humanity's) hearts far from God. But he promises to change hearts to want to obey him, by cleansing them, filling them with his Spirit and forgiving their sin forever. These are new hearts of flesh with a renewed promise of belonging to their God.

As we saw last week, even though the exiles return physically between 538-481 BC, it was not until Jesus came that the spiritual exile was over. He is the one who brings changed hearts to the people of God (now both Jew and Gentile, see Isaiah 11).



- Thank him that he works in us to change our desires, by his Spirit. Pray that he would continue to do this. Ask that we'd keep in step with his Spirit, growing in fruitfulness.

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

What is something that you're waiting for at the moment? How hard is the waiting?

Today we arrive at the end of the Old Testament, with the final prophet, Malachi. Malachi contains a series of disputes between the LORD and the returned exiles. The LORD charges them with the same unfaithfulness that plagued them before the exile.



READ MALACHI 2v17-3v5

- 1. What is Israel's accusation against God?
- 2. What will God do to demonstrate his justice?
- 3. How will they know that the LORD himself is coming and has arrived?
- 4. How should Israel should respond to this fearsome warning?

This message about a coming day of judgement forms the last words of the Old Testament. They are followed by 400 years of silence from God. 400 years of waiting. 400 years until another prophet came to call the people to repentance.


The LORD comes to his temple in Matthew 21, and turns over tables in judgement of the injustice he finds there. He goes on to pronounce curses on Israel's religious and political leaders who haven't led the people to faithfulness to their God (Chapter 23). But in a surprising twist, the only judgement we see carried out is on the cross, where Jesus is forsaken by his father as he dies, disgraced and rejected (Chapter 27). But the story doesn't end there. In triumph and glory, Jesus rises from the grave (Chapter 28).

READ 2 PETER3v3-15

10. How do we know that there will be a final judgment on corrupt and rebellious hearts?

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- Praise God that his judgement is certain. That there will come a day of final justice and truth, where evil is burned up.
- Praise him for Jesus who was judged in our place, so that we can endure that judgement. Praise him that his death and resurrection mean we can look forward to a new heaven and a new earth, where righteousness dwells.
- Pray that looking forward to this day would lead us to live holy and godly lives, making every effort to be found spotless, blameless and at peace with God.
- Praise God that he is patient in delaying that day until more people come to repentance. Pray for the people dear to you, for whom you long to receive salvation.
