The beginning of the Bible immediately raises lots of questions about the origins of the world and how everything came to be how it is. Although it doesn't provide all the scientific answers we would like, Genesis still presents a clear picture of why our world is the way it is today — It started perfectly. It was very good. However, it was quickly spoiled by sin as the first humans decided they wanted more than they thought God was offering them. God banished them from the perfect garden, but he wasn't done with humanity. He is determined to bless his people and creation and we see that as God makes a number of promises to a man named Abram. Genesis tells the story of God's commitment to his own promises.

Over the next 12 weeks, we're going to work our way through Genesis in some rather big chunks, looking for the way God's promises are working out. We'll learn lots about God's character and lots about ourselves as people affected by sin, but we're also going to see how all God's promises point us forward to the Lord Jesus Christ, who we're told in Colossians 1v15-17 is:

"The image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For in him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through him and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together."

HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THIS SERIES COMPANION

We will be looking at GENESIS in some relatively big chunks, so it will be most helpful if you complete the GROWTH GROUP STUDY during the week before the BIBLE TALK. With your group, take you time reading through the passages and don't be afraid to stop and talk about things that grab your attention or raise questions for your group. The questions are there as a guide, but there is lots more to learn about God's character and his faithfulness to his promises than we can capture in a few questions. Make sure you look at the New Testament references too, so that you can see how Genesis points us to Jesus.

On Sunday, make sure you bring your series companion along with you, so that you can keep track of any questions you have and record the way that God's Spirit is helping you to understand His Word and grow in your love for Jesus.

These series companions are designed to be used as either a print version, or interactively on a device. Use whichever method is most helpful for you.



The list of names and places is confusing, try to follow along on the map (the green line). Remember we've already been told about most of these places named after their forefathers in Genesis 10.

Here's the summary: Kedorlaomer is a strong king with 3 vassal states allied with him. He came from East of Canaan and conquered Abram's Canaanite neighbours. These 5 nations eventually joined forces to rebel against Kedorlaomer. He responded with a military campaign to win back the lost territory. A big battle formed up in the Dead Sea valley, but the Canaanite kings lost and fled. Kedorlaomer and his allies stole goods, food and prisoners including Abram's nephew, Lot. When Abram heard the news, he took his allies, pursued Kedorlaomer's armies and recovered the kidnapped people and stolen possessions.

Two Canaanite kings come to meet Abraham as he is returning home. The King of Salem's story is sandwiched between the King of Sodom's to make us compare the two responses to Abraham.

All three of these stories seem far from our culture, worldview and experiences thousands of years later. But in each of them, God seems determined to bless Abram as he promised to do. This is regardless of Abram's obedience or not, his faith or lack of trust and even when the odds are low.

GENESIS 18-19

'ED GUES'

GETTING STARTED

How do you feel when you have surprise guests? Do you love the chaos? Does it send you in to a frenzy of cleaning?

In this section of Genesis we see the Lord appearing, as well as 3 men, and 2 men. As we read today, notice how it's hard to tell how many messengers there are and who is speaking or being spoken to, out of the Lord and the men. Ponder the relationship between the Lord, his word and his messengers.

READ GENESIS 18v1-15

- 1. How does Abraham respond to his surprise guests?
- 2. How does Sarah respond to their message?

Both Abraham and Sarah have now laughed at God's promise of a son in their old age (see Genesis 17v17-19). He will even be named 'He laughs', which is the meaning of Isaac. But despite their mirth, God is determined to keep the promise he made many years earlier. After so much waiting, it will happen within a year.

READ GENESIS 18v16-33

In echoes of the Tower of Babel, God determines to go down to see what the people of the twin towns of Sodom and Gomorrah are up to. Perhaps victims are calling on the name of the Lord (4v26b) or perhaps the very ground cries out against the violence (4v10).

The next section comes with a warning, that it is one of the most disturbing passages in the Bible. You might find that it hits close to home for you, in some way. If so, please feel free to take a break or signal to the leader that you're struggling or talk privately later if you need help.

This is the sordid backstory for two nations that will plague Israel as their enemies for generations to come. God will even say extreme things about them such as:

'No Ammonite or Moabite or any of their descendants may enter the assembly of the LORD, not even in the tenth generation. For they did not come to meet you with bread and water on your way when you came out of Egypt, and they hired Balaam son of Beor from Pethor in Aram Naharaim to pronounce a curse on you. However, the LORD your God would not listen to Balaam but turned the curse into a blessing for you, because the LORD your God loves you. Do not seek a treaty of friendship with them as long as you live.'

Deuteronomy 23v3-6

Throughout the rest of the Bible, the towns of Sodom and Gomorrah become code for God's fierce judgment against sin (this is far broader than rape or homosexuality - see Ezekiel 16v49-50). They are a warning to both Israel and enemy nations alike that God will not tolerate sin forever and they may suffer a similar fate (See Isaiah 13v19 and Lamentations 4v6)

Jesus continues this tradition when he sends his disciples out to teach about his kingdom in the towns of Israel.



GETTING STARTED

The story of Joseph and his brothers is pretty famous and well-known to us (thanks Andrew Lloyd-Webber!) We're going to read back through the story again today and hopefully you'll see something new in a familiar story. The book of Genesis ends with these words from Joseph to his brothers: 'You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives.' As we read through today, notice how God is bringing about his good purposes of salvation despite the evil intentions of the people.

We want to read through it all, so we're going to keep the questions to a minimum as we try to see the big picture. If you're getting tired of reading out loud, you could play a reading from a Bible app.

READ GENESIS 37

1. Jacob clothes his favourite son with an ornate robe, giving him great honour. Clothing in Genesis hides shame (see God's clothing of Adam and Eve in Ch 3 and Noah's sons in Ch 9). But Joseph's brothers strip him of it (killing a goat to deceive the deceiving Jacob), and it looks like even God has abandoned Joseph in an empty well (where he has previously been providing water, see Ch 26). How does this story echo what happens with Cain and Abel?

READ GENESIS 38

2. The story switches scenes to another brother, Judah. Judah was active in sending Joseph to slavery and deceiving their father. But he's passive in this story, where he doesn't seem to care enough about continuing the family line, as God has commanded repeatedly (eg Ch1v28; 9v7; 35v11). In a clever parallel to the previous story, Tamar takes Judah's cord (or robe) as a promise for a goat payment, and he is left shamed. How is Tamar judged to be righteous in this story?

READ GENESIS 39-41

3. Joseph is derobed again, this time by Potiphar's wife. How does God bring him honour at each turn, instead of shame?

READ GENESIS 42

4. What's Joseph's plan in keeping Simeon in prison?

READ GENESIS 43

5. What is ironic about Judah's interaction with his father?

READ GENESIS 44 6. What is Joseph's plan in planting the silver cup in Benjamin's sack?
READ GENESIS 45v1-46v7 7. Joseph has been deceiving his brothers. How does he treat them in the big reveal?
8. Why does he respond this way?
CAST YOUR EYE OVER ALL THE NAMES IN THE REST OF CHAPTER, 46v8-25, THEN READ 46v26-47v319. How is God providing for Jacob and his family?
10. How is God blessing even Pharaoh, for Joseph's sake?
READ GENESIS 48v1-49v28 11.How does this story echo previous blessings of brothers?
12.What do you think it shows about the way God works?

14. Why do you think it's so important for both Jacob and Joseph to be buried in the cave near Mamre?

The book ends on a hopeful note, as God has been keeping the promises of a large nation and blessing to Abraham and his family. Joseph is certain they will receive the land God promised. But there are also hints that Israel will have a hard time in Egypt first the rest is history!

17. How is this a comfort and encouragement to us?

Thank God that he is always in control, even in the midst of evil. Praise him that nothing can stop or thwart his plans to bless his people.
